



## SANTA ANA PUEBLO, BIA SIGN VAST TRACT INTO TRUST


In a significant milestone, the Santa Ana
Pueblo recently secured a trust designation for
a vast piece of ancestral land. This designation
not only prohibits commercial and gaming
development but also ensures the preservation
of the property's natural state as a wildlife
habitat. Patricia Mattingly, director of the
Bureau of Indian Affairs' Southwest regional
office, emphasized the importance of this step.
The Pueblo is wholeheartedly dedicated to
maintaining the land's pristine condition,
allowing it to thrive as a vital habitat for
wildlife. The trust designation significantly
enhances federal protections, safeguarding the
land from misuse and exploitation.

When the Pueblo acquired the land, it bore the scars of neglect—overgrazing, illegal dumping, and hunting had taken their toll. However, Governor Myron Armijo played a crucial role in securing this trust designation. Under his leadership, the Pueblo expresses gratitude for this valuable resource and remains committed to preserving its natural beauty.









The trust designation isn't just about wildlife; it safeguards the land's cultural heritage. Ancient Puebloan ruins, petroglyphs etched by ancestors, and artifacts tell stories of resilience and continuity. Now, these treasures are shielded from harm.

The journey wasn't easy. Legal hurdles, errors in property descriptions, and environmental cleanup tested the Pueblo's resolve. Richard Hughes, the Pueblo's attorney, called it "truly epic." But they persevered, driven by a vision of preservation.

Former Santa Ana Gov. Glenn Tenorio summed it up: "Today is historic for the Pueblo." After eight years of unwavering dedication, they can finally embrace their land wholeheartedly.

In conclusion, the trust designation secures this land—a testament to nature's resilience and the Pueblo's unwavering commitment. As the sun sets over the rolling hills, it illuminates a future where generations will walk in harmony with the land.







## INTERIOR SECRETARY DEB HAALAND SIGNS AN ORDERPROTECTING PUBLIC LANDS

During a community event in Sandoval County, Secretary of the Interior Deb Haaland signed Public Land Order 7940, safeguarding over 4,200 acres of Bureau of Land Management-managed public lands in the Placitas area. This order aims to preserve the scenic integrity, cultural importance, recreational values, and wildlife habitat connectivity of the lands. For the next 50 years, these lands will be closed to new mining claims, mineral sales, and oil and gas leases, while still respecting valid existing rights.

The Placitas area holds significant cultural ties to neighboring Pueblos, particularly the Pueblos of San Felipe and Santa Ana. These indigenous communities have called the area home for thousands of years. The protected land is not only ancestral but also sacred to them. Located near the Albuquerque metro area, it is popular for hiking, camping, sightseeing, and hunting.

Governor Myron Armijo played a role in advocating for this conservation effort. His contributions, were instrumental in ensuring the protection of these special lands. Through collaborative efforts, future generations will continue to enjoy the beauty and unique values of this cherished area. 


we enjoyed beef and vegetarian flautas, slaw, pico, salsa, and another round of delicious Agua frescas to help quench our thirst.



- Emergency Management Operations for Tribal Governments (E581) procedures, and resources for effective emergency management
- · Mitigation for Tribal Officials (E344) covers FEMA's disaster mitigation programs, tribal mitigation opportunities, and examples of mitigation success.



## **FACTS**


- !) More than 19,500 reported fires are started by fireworks annually.
- ! Burns account for 44% of the 9,100 injuries treated in emergency rooms seen in the month around July 4.
- ! Half of the fireworks injuries seen at emergency rooms were extremities: hand, finger, or leg. One-third were to the eye or other parts of the head.
- (!) Children ages 10–14 had the highest rate of fireworks injury, with more than one-third (36%) of the victims of fireworks injuries under age 15.
- (!) Sparklers account for roughly one-quarter of emergency room fireworks injuries.



Thank you to the Conservation Officers-Chris Chadwick, Emmanual Medina, Joey Garcia for sharing all your knowlegdge with our children!












## Language & Culture Department

Officers (John Dickerson, Gary Tafoya, and Nathan Garcia) were
aiding in the fire fighting efforts, traffic control, escorts for
area community members, and assisting Mescalero Conservation
Officers. DNR Director said, "Thanks for everyone's efforts in
helping with this natural disaster, working as a very special team,
their dedication and service, and assisting people who lost
everything." Additional Conservation Officers will be sent on
rotation as needed in the next several weeks.

The Department of Natural Resources, along with the Agriculture and Wellness Departments, were able to showcase their projects that focused on sustainability and economic growth to attendees of the OWEESTA conference. Among the tour participants were US Treasurer, Chief Marilynn Malerba and the Office of Indian Economic Development Director, Onna LaBeau. ## SANTA ANA PUEBLO STEPS UP: FIRST RESPONDERS AID MESCALERO APACHE TRIBE AMID DEVASTATING WILDFIRES

The devastating South Fork fire, which struck Mescalero Apache Tribal lands and their communities, posed a significant challenge to emergency services. In response, Mescalero Leadership sought assistance from Santa Ana Pueblo. The Santa Ana Governors promptly directed the Santa Ana Police Department and the Department of Natural Resources Conservation to organize first responder relief efforts. Their mission: to aid the Mescalero Apache Tribe during this critical time.

- On June 19, an assistance detail was formed, comprising officers from the Santa Ana Police Department (SAPD) and the Department of Natural Resources Conservation. This team, led by SAPD Sgt. Emily Garcia, Officer Jordan Shendo, Officer Jared Antonio, and Conservation Officers John Dickerson, Nathan Garcia, and Gary Tafoya, carried six pallets of water and other essential supplies to Mescalero.
- The officers worked tirelessly, operating twelve-hour shifts around the clock. They transported relief supplies to tribal members and provided backup to local law enforcement.
- On June 25, most officers rotated out, but Sgt. Garcia and Conservation
  Officer John Dickerson remained on duty. Santa Ana communities
  generously donated additional supplies, which were transported to
  Mescalero. SAPD Officer Ryan Tafoya also volunteered for the detail.
- The officers helped manage incoming and outgoing donations, relocated pets and livestock, patrolled evacuated areas, and responded to service calls alongside their Mescalero Apache Conservation Officer partners.
   Mescalero Tribal members expressed deep gratitude for Santa Ana Pueblo's assistance during this crisis.
